# DM Public caps rookie season with state title

Only one of Des Moines Public's two wishes came true as the 9th state high school hockey tournament ended Sunday, but it was the most important wish of a team new to championship hoopla.

Public capped a 19-1 record season with its first state championship. coasting past Urbandale 10-2 at McElrov Auditorium Sunday after-

If getting that first title was sweet. getting it with a first-year team and a first-year coach was sweeter.

Public was the Hoover-Roosevelt team last year, but consolidated again to form the present team and took on Geoff Willson as coach.

"Nothing could be better," said Willson, "This is great. I am surprised we ended the season with just the one loss, but I had so much talent to work with..."

The only thing that could have been sweeter was if Public would have drawn the defending champion Waterloo Warriors in the final, according to Willson.

"We would like to have had Waterloo Public," he said. "It would be a lot more special if we could beat them here to win it."

THE WARRIORS dealt Des Moines its only loss this season, a 5-4 setback during the regular Iowa High School Hockey League season, and their absence from Sunday's title game marked the first time a Waterloo team has not competed for the championship in history.

It is also just the second time ever the championship trophy has not called Waterloo its home. Dowling of West Des Moines won it in 1980. Columbus of Waterloo has five state titles, the Warriors two.

Des Moines' high-powered offense dominated the tournament, scoring 35

goals in three games, and was led by tournament MVP Jim Webb, who had one of two Public hat tricks in Sunday's victory. Webb had a five-goal game Friday in the opening round.

Urbandale's path to the championship included an emotional 7-5 first-round win when the Jayhawks scored four times in the final two minutes and a dramatic 9-8 win over the Warriors in the semifinals Satur-

Public led 3-0 after one period and 4-0 before Urbandale got on the scoreboard early in the second period. Short-handed goals by Al Driscoll and Webb later in the period virtually sewed up the title.

Urbandale cut the lead to 6-2 with a goal in the first minute of the third period, but Laird and Webb each connected twice more as Des Moines won going away.

"It's great to be on top." Laird exclaimed after the win.

Urbandale was whistled for just one penalty in the championship game, but Des Moines made the Jayhawks pay with their only power play goal.

Public had six selections to the allstate team and will lose just five players from the current team to graduation. Urbandale's only allstater was Troy Johnson, who scored one of the two goals Sunday.

Waterloo's win in the third-place game was highlighted by a standout performance by a freshman goal-

Tony Marchese stepped in when regular Brad Nielsen failed to show up to play and turned in a masterful effort. Nielsen elected to watch the game from the stands.

"Tony played a heck of a game," said Warriors Coach Dave Swick. "He kind of surprised me. It was his first big-game experience."

Marchese had not started a varsity game this season and saw only brief varsity action, that coming during a two-game series against Shattuck Academy of Minnesota.

"We were watching him in warmups the other night against Columbus and I had to turn to Terry (assistant coach Hoath) and ask if he was seeing what I was seeing. Tony was kicking and catching everything." Swick added

With backup Paul Nelson on crutches with a sprained ankle, Marchese got the call Sunday and he met the challenge, making 23 saves and checking Ames on just one goal as the Warriors took a 6-1 lead midway through the third period. Then a teammate got him in trouble.

Ames' John Newell scored 9:13 into the period for a 6-2 game. After the play, Waterloo's Ed Wilson checked Newell into the boards and was whistled for kneeing, roughing, un-

That gave Ames a man-advantage for nearly 5 minutes and the Little Cyclones cashed in twice to make the game interesting. Brian Cook salted it away for the Warriors, however, when he carried the puck in and slammed it home for a short-handed goal with 3:45 left.

For two and a half periods, it was one of the Warriors' finest efforts. A balanced combination of the passing game and one-on-one play kept Ames guessing and Waterloo led 3-1 after one period and 5-1 after two.

The Warriors, who defeated Ames twice during the regular season, scored three short-handed goals in the game and finished their season 19-9.

Wilson, Cook Matt Matous and Jim Hayes represented the Warriors on the all-state team. Ames received the tournament's sportsmanship award.

Columbus 5, Dubuque 3

Columbus earned seventh place with its first victory of the tournament.

Dick Long, the Sailors' only allstater, scored 9:22 into the first period and Joel Jasper connected again less than 4 minutes later.

The lead increased to 3-0 as Tony Reuter scored 9:06 into the second period. Dubuque's Optimists came back to make it 3-1, but Reuter, Todd Benson and Jasper worked a play for a 4-1 lead.

Chris Dolan made it 5-14:02 into the final period, but Dubuque closed out the scoring with a goal while skating at a two-man disadvantage and another with 37 seconds left in the

Two of the Sailors' goals came on the power play.

Jon Jasper, who suffered a shoulder injury three-quarters of the way through the season and did not play again, was named honorable mention all-state for Columbus, as was Joel Jasper. The Sailors finished the season 8-13.
