"If we would have played the other two periods like we played the third, we probably would have came out on top," St. Joseph's Rob Lane said.

Lane scored another Griffon goal later in the third.

"Chris Buckles passed it out to me and I shot," Lane said. "The goalie was down and the net was open."

The Sioux City Metros won the tournament by defeating the Kansas City Junior Blades in double overtime.

With the game tied 2-2 late in the second overtime period,

Metro's Brant Mozak slide one in the corner of the goal for the victory and tournament title.

"It was one of those fluke shots." Mozak said. "I shot it at the corner and it hit a couple of skates and went in. Anybody could have put it in. It just happened to be me."

Sioux City jumped ahead by two goals early in the match, but the Blades took advantage of two power plays within the last ten minutes of regulation to tie the game up at two.

"We got up by two and kind of took it easy." Mozak said. "We started to play selfish, and Kansas City came back."

Kansas City's Billy Palmer was the tournament MVP. Palmer scored both of the Blades third period goals in the championship game. Blades goalie Dennis Soetaert won the Silver glove award for the top goalie in the tournament.
