The Metros were 20-13 in regular-season play last season (21-15 overall) and wound up finishing fourth in the IHSHL state tournament in Dubuque, falling to Mason City in the third-place

Kyle Rogers, who would have been a junior this year at Yank-ton (S.D.) High School, has moved with his family to Pennsylvania. Rogers scored 32 goals and added 23 assists to rank third in IHSHL scoring last

season with 55 points.

And, Kyle Jacobson, who scored 13 goals and had 33 assists for a 46 points. sists for a 46-point season, is now attending Shattuck St. Mary's prep school Faribault, Minn. Jacobson would have been a junior at North High

Even with all the missing firepower, the Metros have played very well as a Midget 'A' team in 17 games already this fall. All but one Metro player is eligible for the Midget competition and the squad went 13-3-1 in those 17 outings

This is the first time the high school team has really benefit ted from several kids being able to play the Midget level games before the high school season," said Peck. "We've done pretty well and the play has been encouraging.

"We're also missing some guys still playing high school football so it will be a week or two before we get those guys on

the ice with us. Peck and Gray will be mixing and matching combinations at forward and the blue line until the squad is full strength.

"We'll definitely miss Rogers and Jacobson," said Peck. "Obviously, they would have made us a stronger team, but we've got some young and good goalscorers.
