WATERLOO - Doug Dietz is quick to mention that it was a different era of hockey when he was a defenseman for the 1982-83 Waterloo Warriors team that captured the Iowa High School Hockey League regular-season and tournament titles.

Dietz's vantage has shifted from the ice to the bench, but the Waterloo Warriors' second-year head coach shares one thing in common with his youth

hockey coach, Dave Swick. "What it comes down to is puck possession," Dietz said. "Dave Swick always talked about having puck possession and that's what I've strived to have this team do is not play slap hockey, but

possess the puck. "The more times you have the puck on your stick, the more opportunities you have to make plays and have teams try to out-work you to

get the puck back." With an impressive 31-1-0 record, Waterloo has been in control throughout the 2011-12 season. The Warriors are hoping to become the first Waterloo team to win regular-season and tournament

titles in the same season since the 1982-83 squad. That quest will begin against Lincoln at 6 p.m. Friday in Ames as Midwest High School Hockey League postseason play gets under way. The tournament runs

through Sunday. "What they have done has not been done since." Warriors senior captain Jake Lichty said, addressing the 1982-83 championship teams, "If we could pull this off, it would be great and it
