The Mohawks were 2-10-1 through 13 games and near the bottom of the league standings, but head coach Mark Hicks never thought his team would miss the

playoffs.

"To be honest, yeah I did (think we would make it)," Hicks said, "I had a lot of confidence in our team and I saw the schedule we had and I thought this is right where we'd be."

The Mohawks (15-12-1-0)

came into Mason City as one of the top teams in the league, but on that night, the Mohawks didn't seem to Mason City came back

from a two-goal deficit to beat the Warriors 4-3 in a shootout and the win sparked big things for the

The Mohawk Hockey Club followed up that win by taking its next six contests and 12 of its last 14

But what changed from the first half to the second? "Once we got on that little streak, we just kind of got our confidence going," said junior Joe Burgmeier.

"When you can move the puck and know where your teammates are going, it's a great thing."

This team is nearly the polar opposite of a team a year ago that failed to make it into the postseason and it may have left a bit of a chip on the shoulder.

"Not being there last year was devastating for us," Hicks said.

A little bit of that disappointment may have crossed over to the start of this year. but clearly, it has been corrected.

"This team is way different than it was last year and the beginning of this year." Maulsby said.

Maulsby, along with Burgmeier, have been a large reason for the Mohawks' second-half turnaround.

"They're arguably two of the best players in the league," Hicks said, "There's a lot of pressure that they put on themselves to perform, they're very competitive, and they always seem to come to the rink and get the job done."

And the numbers back that up. The pair is tied for second in the league

in scoring with 65 points apiece. Burgmeier has 32 goals and 33 assists. while Maulsby has 30 goals and 35 assists.

A newcomer has also given the Mohawks an added threat and is as a nice compliment to Burgmeier and Maulsby.

Freshman Lucas McKinnon has stepped right in to contribute quality ice time for Mason City.

McKinnon ended the regular season third on the team in points with 26 (10 goals, 16 assists).

"Lucas has just done a phenomenal job," Hicks said. "Over the 13 years I've coached, we've had a few freshmen step in and play big roles and he's probably played the biggest role out of any of them that I can remember."

Along with sophomore goalie Anthony Piscopo, who is 14-5, allowing an average of 2.74 goals per game, this team has the ingredients to make a run in Ames, but it won't be easy.

"It's going to be tough. There's not a bad team in the tournament, so no matter what seed you're at, whether it's first or eighth, it's going to be a tough tournament," Hicks said.
