Metros begin MHSHL hockey slate Saturday

SIOUX CITY | The way Dave Legree looks at it, hockey practices are meant to be hard and the games are supposed to be fun.

A long-time coaching veteran in the Sioux City youth hockey ranks, the 59-year-old Toronto (Canada) native is all about discipline and correcting habits. His goal, as the new coach of the Sioux City Metros, is to take both varsity and junior varsity teams back to the Midwest High School Hockey League state tournament.

"The kids are up for it," said Legree, who will kick off the 28-game MHSHL season with Saturday

afternoon's 3 o'clock game at the IBP Ice Center against the defending West Division champion Kansas City Jets. "We've discussed what it

takes to be successful. In my opinion, it takes hard work. You have to be disciplined. Off the ice, you have to prepare yourself for the game. My motto for the kids playing for me is the team comes first. There's no I in a team. I've never seen one person win a championship."

Team captain and left wing Skyler Beller returns to lead the Metros' top line. Last season, Beller paced the 9-18-1 squad coached by Brant Mozak with 39 points, a total that included 24 goals and 15 assists.

Hockey is Beller's top

sport, but he's also in the midst of his second high school football season at Hinton. Heading into Monday

has a great shot with eron Kramer combined for 18 good puck goals on the IV team. handling skills," said Legree, "He needs work on

his playmaking, but he's talented and at 6-foot-2. he's a good draw man.

"Chance Jensen has speed. He's quick. He can take off on a dime. Skyler is a quiet young man and the kids respect him. He's very talented. He has a heavy shot."

Sioux City, which will also host Kansas City starting at 10 a.m. Sunday, has two other strong lines. Trent Harsma, James Page and Josh

Menzenberg worked together on a line during the preseason when the Metros posted a 4-2-1 record. Sam Holzrichter, Caleb Sneller and Cam-

Jordan Reynolds and Corv Goss lead the Metros' defensemen. Reynolds scored 10 points (1, 9) last season, one more than Goss (3, 6).

"I want them to be leaders and finish their high school career leading this team to state," said Legree. "Both can skate and both like to carry the puck. They understand what to do. Both of them have great shots. I can see stuff I can add to their game to help them out."

Jarett Heyl contributed six assists as a defenseman last

season, Logan Visser, Grant Newman and Christan Peterson add to the unit.

Ben Morehead is likely the Metros' starting goaltender for the seasonopener. Morehead went 4-9 last season with a 5.67 goals-against-average, vet recorded the team's lone shutout.

Logan Teiral split time on the varsity (2-5, 4.74 GAA) and the junior varsity (8-2-1, 1.54). Carter Manthrone completes a unit that Legree calls "even."

"Morehead's the veteran," said Legree. "Ben's been there before. I've got him playing the puck more and firing it to the wingers. He's a good kid. He's a leader too, the way he talks to the kids."
